- I. AB212 Program Development / Subsidized Consortium**
  - Receiving registrations for *CPIN, Preschool Learning Foundation Volume I*, workshop for Saturday, January 30, 2010.
  - Will host *CSEFEL, Center on Social and Emotional Foundations for Early Learning*, workshop on Saturday, March 27, 2010. This training component will consist of local leadership team development, one day training on Module #1, with follow up technical assistance and coaching from CSEFEL trainers. Approximately, 100 CDD staff members will receive the training.
  
- II. State LPC Certification Statement Regarding Composition of LPC Membership**
  - Reported on CCPC membership composition for 2009/10.
  
- III. Together For Kindergarten (TFK) Stakeholders Committee**
  - Attended TFK Stakeholders Committee meeting where collaborators, Applied Survey Research, Walnut Avenue Women's Center, First 5 and SCCOE, gathered to design a countywide kindergarten transition plan and logic model.
  
- IV. Board of Supervisors Visits**
  - Coordinated Board of Supervisors visits and assisted with strategic planning to ensure effectiveness of CCPC message and visits.
  
- V. ASAP Transition Committee**
  - Attended the ASAP Transition meeting to assist in designing kindergarten transition activities for early care educators and kindergarten teachers.
  
- VI. Child Snapshot Ad Hoc Committee**
  - Attended two ad hoc committee meetings and assisted with editing and developing a distribution plan for the Child Snapshot through AB212 programs.
  
- VII. Board of Supervisors Monthly Meeting**
  - At the January Board of Supervisors meeting BOS appointed two new members to the council; Christina Herrera, category # 1 Consumers and Leticia Mendoza, category # 2 Child Care Providers.

- Spoke during the public hearing for the County Housing Element In support of recognizing single female head of household as “Special Populations.” Child care was identified as an essential service needed in close proximity of housing.
