

Jeanie McLoughlin (San Mateo County)

Jeanie McLoughlin is the Director of Preschool for All San Mateo County, a relatively new position at the San Mateo County Office of Education and funded by First 5 San Mateo County in October 2004. For the previous 6 years she was the coordinator for the San Mateo County local child care planning council. In that capacity, Ms. McLoughlin helped to coordinate numerous grants totaling millions of dollars, and developed partnerships to carry out successful countywide efforts including the passage of AB1326 - the San Mateo County Child Care Subsidy Pilot. She worked with many community partners to design the Preschool For All initiative for San Mateo County. Actively working in the field of early care and education in San Mateo County for almost 20 years, in March 2004 Ms. McLoughlin was inducted by the Commission on the Status of Women into the San Mateo County Women's Hall of Fame. She has an A.S. in Early Childhood Education and a B.A. in Human Services Administration

Angie Garling (Alameda County)

Angie coordinates the Child Care Planning Council for Alameda County, California. She also serves as the Co-Chair elect for the California Child Care Coordinators Association. She has been selected to participate in two national leadership programs in early childhood policy and strategic communications. She has a Master's degree from UC Berkeley in Educational Psychology and Human Development over a decade of experience working with low-income and special needs children and families.

Yolanda Garcia (Santa Clara County)

Yolanda Garcia joined WestEd in 2002 as the Director of the E3 Institute. She directs the advocacy and communication functions of the Institute and supervises several other Institute responsibilities: the Compensation and Retention Educational Support (CARES) program; the Institute's planning and design of a professional development system; the development of contracts, agreements, and data systems; and Institute marketing strategies and fund development.

Garcia has worked in the field of early childhood education and family support for three decades. For 20 years she directed the Children's Services Department for the Santa Clara County (CA) Office of Education. While in that position, she served on the national Head Start Quality Committee that recommended the development of Early Head Start. Other experience includes analyzing public policy as a fellow with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and developing a grant-making strategy for early education and family support at the Charles Mott Foundation, where she was recruited as a senior program officer. Garcia has served on the National Association for the Education on Young Children's Quality and Compensation Committee and on the American Academy of Sciences' Committee on the Integration of Sciences in Early Childhood Education, contributing to the academy's seminal report, *From Neurons to Neighborhoods: The Science of Early Childhood Development*.

Garcia holds an MS in social services administration with an emphasis in child welfare and public policy from the University of Chicago and an MA in education administration from San Jose State University.

Gloria Corral (San Francisco County)

Gloria Corral is the Deputy Director at First 5 San Francisco. Prior to her arrival to First 5, she was the Director of Policy and Outreach for Preschool California a broad-based multi-year advocacy campaign to achieve voluntary preschool for all of California's 4-year-olds. Ms. Corral also worked as the Regional Manager for the West at Educational Testing Service. She provided consultative services to school districts on assessment, teacher training and second language acquisition issues. Ms. Corral also worked on issues of school finance and state assessments while working at the policy office at WestEd. Ms. Corral began her policy work at the United States Department of Education and then worked in the United States Congress after graduating from the Graduate School of Public Policy at UC Berkeley.
